

Opening for private prayer.

The church will open for private prayer this Monday 22nd June from 11 am until 3 pm and from 6 -7 pm. We are grateful to those who have agreed to be stewards to guide people as they enter, to direct them to the seats that are available, and indicate the one way system which is in place. (Stewards were contacted mostly by email. If you wish your email address to be added to the ones we have, you can indicate this be emailing the parish address.

- 1. Face coverings must be worn. Please bring your own if possible.
- 2. A one way system will be in place. Enter by the middle aisle and exit by the side aisles.
- 3. Seating arrangements will observe social distance. Bringing your own cushion would also help. Wooden surfaces, It would seem, carry the virus for up to 2 days. (See 6 below)
- 4. Toilets are not to be used. Exceptions may be made and when there are exceptional circumstances they are to be cleaned and disinfected after each use.
- 5. The church will be cleaned each morning before opening.
- 6. Sanitisers are to be used on entering and leaving and if you wish you can use the wipes available to go over the seat you are to use.
- 7. Candles are not to be handled but if you wish you can request the steward to light one for you.

Confessions. This week, all being well, the Sacrament of Reconciliation will be available Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from 6-7 pm when the church is expected to be quieter. It is intended to set up a screen at the front of the church, beside the organ, and religious music may be played which may avoid people being overheard. At least, missing Mass will not be featuring since the obligation has been suspended these past few months!

WEBSITE OF THE WEEK

Lectio Divina is the oldest method of Bible reading, systematised around the 5th century. It is a dialogue between the written biblical word and life experience. In the dialogue our experience throws light on the Bible word, bringing it to life for us so that we feel at home with it. The Bible word in turn throws light on our experience which is transformed from merely being an event into being a word of God spoken to us.

Lectio Divina presupposes that every Bible text speaks to the imagination. It invites us to enter through our imagination into the movement.
