Prayers Requested. We are asked to keep in mind all who are ill at this time, and family, relatives and friends unable to be present with them as a result of the coronavirus. For parishioners a private Mass will be said for the deceased on the morning of the funeral or as near as possible to the day of the funeral. We look forward to seeing a bit more of him then, in the near future.

Unemployment and other financial situations mean that many are not able to keep up contributions as in the past, and we hope that the situation improves soon.





Mary Bernadine MacIver 1927 – 2020 RIP

Mary was one of seven children born to John and Elizabeth MacPherson on August 19th 1927 on the Island of Barra in the Outer Hebrides. She attended school on Barra and on completion of the school, Mary went to Aberdeen Domestic Science College, returning home to Barra to work in the family guest house. She was a wonderful cook and a great baker.

Mary married Calum, also from Barra, in Oban Cathedral on November 16th 1950 and had a family of six, Donnie, Valerie, Neil, Gerry, Iain and Anna. Sadly, Iain died aged eleven months in 1961.

Due to Calum's ill health, the family moved to Glasgow in 1971, settling in Sandwood Road. Here the family was raised and Mary cared for her husband until Calum sadly passed away in 1978

For a period of time after Calum's passing, Mary worked as a Health Care Assistant in the 'old 'Southern General Hospital, until her retirement. After this, Mary cared for her sister Katie, who passed away in 2005.

Mum was a Eucharist Minister, as were most of her church friends. She and her friends helped to clean the church and assisted with many different aspects of the church including church hall functions, baking for ceilidhs and other social events.

Mary was a kind, gentle, unassuming, elegant lady. She loved her family, and enjoyed working in her garden and spent summer months at home on Barra .

Mum's decline with vascular dementia saddened the family but in relative terms Mary bore her ill health, with as much fortitude the illness allowed.

The final year of Mary's life was in Nazareth House where Mary was cared for with great respect and dignity, by a wonderful team of staff, on Lamarnier, in Nazareth house.

Mary was devoted to Our Lady, and prayed the rosary faithfully every day. It was fitting then that it was in Our Lady's month of May, on the 12th that she passed away peacefully in her sleep.

Mary will rest in peace in Eoligarry, Isle of Barra.

Sadie Coulter RIP. On Monday last the funeral took place of Sadie Coulter, a sister of Alex who died last year and Patricia (Pat) who died in 2014. That was a sore loss for Sadie for they stayed together and worked well as a team, Pat doing the cooking, Sadie keeping the house impeccably neat and tidy.

Sadie was born in Govan 78 years ago and on leaving school she became a secretary with Rolls Royce. She excelled at her work and by the time of her retirement she was the PA for the Managing Director of Rolls Royce Scottish Division. The high regard in which she was held was indicated by the many cards and gifts on her retirement.

With the onset of Alzheimer's Sadie came to reside in Deanfield where she helped the staff to set the tables, fold the laundry as well as taking part in all the activities. The family are grateful for the care given and especially at the end when they were unable to be with her.

Sadie's participation at the Vigil Mass each Saturday expressed her baptismal gift of sharing in the priesthood of Christ and we can be confident that she will be continuing to pray for us now.

A plenary indulgence is granted For Sufferers Unable to receive the Sacrament of the Sick or Viaticum on the point of death.

The Church prays for those who find themselves unable to receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick and of the Viaticum, entrusting each and every one to divine Mercy by virtue of the communion of saints and granting the faithful a Plenary Indulgence on the point of death, provided that they are duly disposed and have recited a few prayers during their lifetime (in this case the Church makes up for the three usual conditions required). For the attainment of this indulgence the use of the crucifix or the cross is recommended (cf. Enchiridion indulgentiarum, no.12).
