

Prayers Requested. We are asked to keep in mind all who are ill at this time, and family, relatives and friends unable to be present with them as a result of the coronavirus. For parishioners a private Mass will be said for the deceased on the morning of the funeral or as near as possible to the day of the funeral. We remember also those whose anniversaries occur including, John O'Malley, James Freer, Peggy Harkess, John O'Neill.

A plenary indulgence is granted For Sufferers Unable to receive the Sacrament of the Sick or Viaticum on the point of death.

The Church prays for those who find themselves unable to receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick and of the Viaticum, entrusting each and every one to divine Mercy by virtue of the communion of saints and granting the faithful a **Plenary Indulgence** on the point of death, provided that they are duly disposed and have recited a few prayers during their lifetime (in this case the Church makes up for the three usual conditions required). For the attainment of this indulgence the use of the crucifix or the cross is recommended (cf. Enchiridion indulgentiarum, no.12).

Fr Hugh Seenan has made a video for us and it should be available this weekend. He has also kindly agreed to do a reflection for Sunday 14th June, the feast of the Body and Blood of Our Lord.
